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

Video Live Stream System Installed in the Nave

In December work was completed on the installation of video equipment for livestreaming from the Cathedral. Three cameras are mounted in fixed positions in the sanctuary. The cameras are controlled from a central mixer and each camera can be remotely controlled to zoom the lens in or out for just the right picture. The cameras (one is pictured on the right) may also be swiveled to cover most of the room.

Livestreaming will permit the regular telecast of select services and programs taking place in the Cathedral. We will begin using the equipment in January for livestreaming Sunday services of Holy Eucharist at 10 am.



"It will make us more attractive to young families – who are increasingly opting for convenience – and it will let our older membership continue to worship with us if they become unable to leave their homes. Offering highquality livestreaming will also allow us to support Diocesan worship more effectively and will raise the profile of St. Paul's and the Diocese of Iowa locally, nationally, and beyond," said Provost Amma Nicola. "We're excited about the possibilities."



Rick Stearns has overseen the installation by Triad Productions and Baker Electric, and identified a new hourly employee qualified to run the system professionally.

"We faced some interesting challenges caused by the age of our building, and we had to modify original plans several times along the way to protect it," said Stearns. "The pictures from the new cameras are stunning and show off the beauty of our Cathedral."

Amy Mellies, our Diocesan Missioner for Children and Youth sent each family supplies in the mail with coloring pages and candy for the big day. St. Nick shared his story with the kids, answered questions and prayed for them. We all had a blast.

A special thanks goes to Mike McCarthy, who played the important role of St. Nicholas.

St. Paul's families enjoyed a driving tour and short outdoor walk together at the Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge (near Prairie City, Iowa) on November 21st. It was Amma Nicola's third visit there - and the first one in which it was possible to see bison and elk without the use of binoculars! All agreed that the Neal Smith refuge is a 'hidden gem' and that a future visit is in order when the visitor center re-opens.

Cathedral Arts Notes Evensong Services, Carillon Concerts Continue with an Iowa Debut Broadcast

In the closing months of 2020, St. Paul's notable Cathedral Arts Series hosted a number of events which greatly increased our presence in the community and the state. Our livestreaming of services and carillon concerts continues to expand. Our Sunday, November 22 Evensong Service was broadcast throughout the Diocese, an Iowa first. An Advent Evensong service was also broadcast locally on Sunday, December 13. St. Paul's is the only church in Central Iowa offering this uniquely beautiful, soothing worship service at the end of the day.

The keystones of Evensong are the Magnificat (also known as The Song of Mary) and the Nunc Dimitis (also known as the Song of Simeon), and although in the past the musical settings for both were composed by such composers as Herbert Howell or John Rutter, for these services – with limited rehearsal time and a small choir – Choirmaster/Organist Mark Babcock turned to our ever-resourceful Hymnal for these parts of the service, which also meant that those watching the livestream could sing along with both of these as well as the services' hymns.

Advent Organ Concerts

This long-time St. Paul's seasonal tradition continued with Babcock offering two Noon Organ Concerts (on December 10 and December 17), both of which highlighted the seasonal music in our Hymnal. Advent hymns correspond with the lectionary, and the subconscious effect on our mood and our attitudes is substantial: for instance, "There's a Voice in the Wilderness Crying" (Hymn 75) and "On Jordan's Banks the Baptist's Cry" (Hymn 76) supplement the readings about John the Baptist, and settings of "The Angel Gabriel" (Hymn 265) increase our appreciation for Advent's contemplation and quiet reassurance that a new life is coming into the world. In the past these concerts have been well attended by the public, but this year – as we know well – was unusual because our customary audience could not be present, which meant that

both concerts were necessarily livestreamed on our Facebook page and YouTube channel.

Cocoa Carols and Carillon

New this year for our Cathedral Arts series was the December 20th Christmas Carols concert and outdoor sing-a-long. Many attendees dressed in festive attire: stocking caps and hats with appliqued elf ears were popular. Babcock's musicianship – equal to any and rivaled by none – guaranteed that the 45-minute concert emphasized our wonderful two-octave carillon, as well as the beautiful music of both Advent and Christmas.

Derecho Damage to St. Paul's Roof Is Repaired

Based on analyses from the public and private sectors, no single thunderstorm event in modern times – not even a tornado – wrought as much economic devastation as the derecho that slammed the nation's Corn Belt on Aug. 10. Fortunately damage to St. Paul's was minimal, the winds tore away some of the roof's copper flashing (conveniently leaving it on the 9th Street parking). The accompanying photo shows the workers repairing the damage.

New Life for the Undercroft

The Undercroft Task Force (UTF) has voted unanimously in favor of the OPN architecture firm and the Chapter has approved.

Our choice was based on their attention to details and in particular the intense interest and understanding revealed by OPN principal architect Rick Seely. OPN has recently turned the 1904 Carnegie Library in Indianola into a 21st century home for the Des Moines Metro

Opera and they served as principal on-site architects for the Renzo Piano designed Kum & Go headquarters overlooking the Western Gateway sculpture park.

Going forward, the development of Part 1 of the project will yield figures and visuals that will provide the materials the church will need to secure funding for the complete and necessary overhaul of the Undercroft. The UTF is led by Amma Nicola, co-chairs Tony Braida and Elvin McDonald, and team members John Doherty, Phyllis Melton, Anne Reasons, and John Zickefoose.

Do you need to talk or want a visit?

It's been a hard year. Many people are feeling lonely and stressed. You might need someone to pray or chat with you. All our clergy are available for phone calls and video chats as well as Covid responsible visits. We recognize however that some members of our community are particularly high risk and vulnerable to the coronavirus. Father Zeb, as the spouse of a high risk person, is taking charge of providing visitation for high risk individuals and is taking extra measures to ensure he does not contract the virus. Here are just a few of the steps he is taking to ensure the safety of those he visits:

- He does not engage in high risk activities, including large group gatherings.
- If he feels he needs to attend a gathering of more than 10 people, he will get a Covid-19 test done before resuming pastoral care visits.
- He limits in-store shopping as much as possible. He gets contactless delivery and orders online whenever possible. (He's fallen in love with services like Target Drive Up)

- He does not eat inside restaurants and gets contactless delivery whenever possible. He does the majority of his work virtually and limits
 - in-person interactions with co-workers to essential meetings.
- He uses safety measures when gathering in small groups (less than 10 people) with others outside their household, requiring that all wear masks, socially distancing, washing and sanitizing hands frequently and gathering outdoors if possible.
- He will keep a log of visits for contact tracing if it is necessary.

We believe that everyone should have pastoral care available to them, no matter their risk levels. If you need an in-person visit, but worry about your risk level, Fr. Zeb is available for you and wants you to know that he is limiting his risk of exposure for your benefit. The recent blizzard prompted a search for Vicki Ingham's cover photo (detail here), and the storm's aftermath made me again recall the last line of the wonderful poem, *Snow-Storm*, by Ralph Waldo Emerson (1803 – 1882) which he wrote in 1834.




Shortly after the storm Fr. Zeb posted on Facebook this image of his neighbor's Christmas display with the observation "My neighbor's Mary has the best hairdo," another example of Nature's frolic.

These storms always remind me of the illustrations of American artist Eyvind Earle (1916 – 2000), noted for his contribution to the background illustration and styling of Walt Disney's



animated films in the 1950s. One of his winter illustrations is below; appealingly the weight of the snow has fashioned the tree boughs into Gothic arches suggesting a cathedral. Emerson's complete poem is below as well.



The Snow-Storm

Announced by all the trumpets of the sky, Arrives the snow, and, driving o'er the fields, Seems nowhere to alight: the whited air Hides hills and woods, the river, and the heaven, And veils the farm-house at the garden's end. The sled and traveller stopped, the courier's feet Delayed, all friends shut out, the housemates sit Around the radiant fireplace, enclosed In a tumultuous privacy of storm.

Come see the north wind's masonry. Out of an unseen quarry evermore Furnished with tile, the fierce artificer Curves his white bastions with projected roof Round every windward stake, or tree, or door. Speeding, the myriad-handed, his wild work So fanciful, so savage, nought cares he For number or proportion. Mockingly, On coop or kennel he hangs Parian wreaths; A swan-like form invests the hidden thorn; Fills up the farmer's lane from wall to wall, Maugre the farmer's sighs; and, at the gate, A tapering turret overtops the work. And when his hours are numbered, and the world Is all his own, retiring, as he were not, Leaves, when the sun appears, astonished Art To mimic in slow structures, stone by stone, Built in an age, the mad wind's night-work, The frolic architecture of the snow.
