season observed in many Western Christian churches, Advent is a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Jesus. Traditionally Christians use this time to prepare and remember the real meaning of Christmas.

erived from the Latin "adventus," which means "coming," Advent marks the beginning of a new liturgical year and encompasses the span of time from the fourth Sunday before Christmas until the Nativity of Our Lord is celebrated on December 25th.

erifying historically when the period of preparation for Christmas now called Advent first began is difficult, though it was certainly in existence from about 480. Some sources say it goes back to the time of the Twelve Apostles or that it was founded by St. Peter himself.

quivalent to Lent in some ways, Advent is a preparatory season, significant because it is a time of looking forward and waiting for something greater: the annual celebration of the event of Christ's birth, and for the time when He will come again. The early Advent season was mainly penitential, much like Lent.

owadays a penitential theme still exists, but it is not as intensely observed.

It is blended with the theme of prayerful, spiritual preparation for the second and final coming of the Lord as well as the joyful preparation for the annual festive remembrance of the Incarnation of Christ's birth.

raditions for observing this time can vary from place to place, influenced by culture. Practices associated with Advent include keeping an Advent calendar, lighting an advent wreath, and special services of Lessons and Carols. Here at St. Paul's we hope you will join us for this special season.





The Advent Wreath

Like many churches, St. Paul's always has an Advent wreath near the chancel steps, and we mark our progress toward Christmas by lighting an additional candle every Sunday. Although possibly rooted in pre-Christian traditions, the custom of lighting candles set in a wreath of evergreens lends itself well to Christian symbolism (eternal life, the Light of Christ, hope). We use four candles for the four Sundays of Advent, three of them blue to symbolize royalty. Some churches, particularly the Roman Catholic Church, continue to use purple instead of blue, emphasizing the penitential aspect of a season of preparation similar to Lent. The candle symbolism is:



1st candle, blue: Prophecy candle or Hope

2nd candle, blue: Bethlehem candle or Preparation

3rd candle, rose: Shepherd candle or Joy (Gaudete Sunday)

4th candle, blue: Angel candle or Love

The white candle in the center is the Christ candle (the spotless Lamb of God).

During this special season our Sunday Adult form considers The Advent of Creation: Explore the hopes and expectations of the season illuminated by the spectacular "Six Days of Creation" needlepoint on display in the Chapel. The group meets Sundays at 9 am in the Chapel, and all are welcome. Illustrated on the left is "Day Two The Firmament."


Greening the Cathedral

EXCERPTS FROM A TALK GIVEN AFTER THE 10 A.M. MASS

ON NOVEMBER 13TH by Stewardship Chair Rick Stearns

hen we talk about stewardship it is important to remember that it consists of three different elements: time, talent and treasure. When it comes to the first two, time and talent, we are truly blessed at St. Paul's. So many people lend both their time and talent to make this place work. From the various committees and cloisters to the vestry and other small groups it is amazing how many people get involved. And then there are the outreach programs: The shelter meal, where people from St. Paul's prepare casseroles, donate salad and dressing and provide dessert and serve the meal monthly. We will serve nearly 3,000 people this year. Connections Café, which serves lunch five days a week in the undercroft and members of St. Paul's prepare sandwiches monthly will serve approximately 30,000 people this year. Then there is Backpack Buddies, making sure elementary school children have nutritious meals on the weekends and our contributions of food and money to the Food Bank. If you are not currently involved in any of these ministries I encourage you to get involved. You'll feel good about what you're doing and it gives you the opportunity to get to know your fellow members at St. Paul's a bit better.

This year we have a unique set of circumstances: we are, for the first time in ages, debt free. We have been able to retire what was referred to as the garden loan, money that was borrowed to complete the parking lot and gardens, a loan from the diocese for the same project (altogether \$106,641.62), and we have repaid money borrowed from the endowment over the past two years (\$80,000). This means that none of your pledge dollars will go to

service debt. The other thing making this year

unique is that because of the success of last year's capital campaign, where money was donated and pledged towards the Cathedral Preservation Fund, any needed repairs will come from the earnings of this fund and not out of our operating budget. When you combine these two things it really sets us up for the future. Another thing that has recently happened is that the vestry has made the decision to bring on a Communications Consultant to give us insights on how to grow the church. This individual has just started and we will soon be receiving direction on how to take advantage of the explosive growth occurring in downtown Des Moines and how we can increase our exposure to the community. Through your generosity we will have the money to execute the plan. What a great decision on the part of the leadership at St. Paul's.

Y our pledge for 2017 will go to pay the overhead of the church--from utility bills to snow removal to supplies and more. It will also go to pay administrative salaries and to help fund our many ministries. Unique to this year it gives us the opportunity to grow the parish--to put more people in the pews. We are now pointed in exactly the right direction and we need to take advantage of this opportunity. Your pledge dollars have never been more important. Opportunity is staring us right in the face and now is the time to act.

W e hank you in advance for your time and treasure, and your talents. They are deeply appreciated and they bless us always.
