

Faith Sharing Dinners *Moderated by Deacon John Doherty*

What are the Sharing Faith gatherings? The gatherings are designed to come together over a simple meal and get to know each other by sharing faith stories based on questions on story cards. Sharing personal faith stories help us to deepen our own faith, and hearing others' stories of God's presence in their lives brings us into deeper relationship with each other.

When are the dinners? The groups will meet on September 27th at 5:30 PM. Plan to stay for one hour.

Where are the dinners? The dinners are at the church. Small groups of 6-8 people gather at each table. There is no cost to attend although we ask for RSVP's so we can plan the meal.

Who will attend? All members of any worshipping congregation, along with friends, are encouraged to participate. This is a shared experience. People of all ages are welcome. There are age appropriate questions and no one is required to answer.

From the Dean

Hello friends,

As our families begin to have their children return to school, and we take up again the familiar patterns of family life, I am mindful that sometimes those patterns formerly included weekly Sunday worship, but new priorities were set in place for the summer and it is often difficult to take on the holy discipline of weekly Sunday worship together.

The importance of weekly gathered worship came up in a recent article that I read. In it, the author addresses one of the great, prevailing ailments of our age, what is being called the “loneliness epidemic”, and it asks the important question about how the Church can be a part of addressing this troubling aspect of our present cultural landscape.

The author begins the article thusly:

“By now, you’ve probably seen the headlines:

- ▶ “Surgeon General Says There’s a Loneliness Epidemic” (The Washington Post)
- ▶ “Young People Report More Loneliness Than the Elderly” (USA Today)
- ▶ “The Biggest Threat Facing Middle-Aged Men Isn’t Smoking or Obesity. It’s Loneliness” (The Boston Globe)
- ▶ “The Surprising Effects of Loneliness on Health” (The New York Times)
- ▶ “Loneliness Begets More Loneliness” (The Atlantic)
- ▶ “How Social Isolation Is Killing Us” (The New York Times)
- ▶ “Social Isolation Kills More People Than Obesity” (Slate)

Americans are lonelier than ever—even though opportunities for social connection have exponentially increased. Even with affordable phone calls and free email, we’re talking to each other less. Despite the prevalence of car ownership and the low cost of cross-country air travel, we’re spending less time with our families.”

So, how can gathering together every week, and through each week, begin to address this most human need for belonging, to feeling connected and helping to bring healing to our loneliness?

First, a diagnosis of the origins of the epidemic of loneliness: Me before We. That is, our highly individualistic society bridles as being told what to do, or believe, and so we are left trying to “find our true selves” on our own, usually following all the least healthy paths, in ways that leave us disconnected from others.

Vanishing Relationships are at the heart of the epidemic of loneliness as more and more of our interactions are mediated and digital/electronic rather than in person. Being made in the image of God, we are deeply relational beings, and the lack of real, personal, lived human contact leaves us lonely and disconnected from life.

So, how may the Church help us to become more attuned to our need for living, breathing relationality, and provide ways in which we may become connected to each other and to God?

The author has a few suggestions:

The Church must learn to establish membership through a sense of belonging; not just a commitment to a place, but a belonging to a community of loving people.

We must prioritize Life-Giving Community over simply being busy together.

We must also prioritize shared, Spirit guided leadership through the engagement of every member of the parish.

We must embrace Friendship and Community in the way that Jesus was intensely relational.

Finally, we must Be Devoted to One Another, as St. Paul writes:

“Be devoted to one another in love. Honor one another above yourselves. Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord. Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer. Share with the Lord’s people who are in need. Practice hospitality.”

A Guide to Writing Your Story

First, let us say that your story is unique – whoever you are. We are a diverse community and have come to St. Paul's in many different ways. In order to understand and learn about each other, we would like to have your story to publish on our website's blog (CathedralChurchofStPaul.org/stories-of-the-people-of-st-pauls).

It doesn't have to be 300 words – it can be 10 words. The 300 is a

maximum guideline so that Elvin and I don't get too bleary eyed.

Secondly, by answering the following five questions: Who? What? Where? Why? When? And How (optional)? You will be on your way.

Answers to these five questions provide the basis for your story. Anything else you write is gravy.

So, it goes like this – tell us Who you are; What brought you to St. Paul's; Where did you come from; When did you join St. Paul's, Why did you pick St. Paul's, and How did you get here (optional).

Answer the parts you are comfortable with. These are tips to help you get started.




November 3, 2018

Sanctuary Movement

Why I am part of the sanctuary discernment team:

In 1985, I was introduced to a young man from El Salvador who had fled his country in fear for his life. Both of his parents were killed by the government soldiers and he was told that he would be next. He lived in a Methodist church in Cedar Rapids and had church and community members come and stay at the church 24 hours a day to protect him from deportation back to El Salvador, where he would surely be killed. As we got to know Guillermo, it was clear that he had gone through terrible suffering and needed compassion and protection. After we moved to Des Moines the next year, I became part of a group of women called Women For Guatemala who

studied the history of U.S., involvement in that country and the suffering that came from the resulting overthrow of their democratically- elected government. We gave presentations about Guatemala, its history, culture and people and we sold weavings to help support poor indigenous women. So why be involved in sanctuary now? I believe that these countries (and others) are still dangerous places for many families to live. And I believe that, as a Christian, I am called to help those suffering pain and injustice in any way I can. For right now, our role is accompaniment of families to their immigration hearings, but if a greater need arises, our committee are trying to discern what God calls us to do to help our fellow human beings. I am proud to be part of a church that has such a committee.

Look for changes coming soon to the Guild Hall! New lighting will be installed; paint and carpeting will be new as well. Chair covering will be updated, and new seating options will be located around the area. Many thanks to the individuals who spear-headed this endeavor, particularly Elvin MacDonald and his committee.

Repairs are being done to the entrance area to the Undercroft off the lower High Street door. The committee also has approved a bid to do stone repair to the exterior.

The next major restoration effort will be new flooring in the nave and choir, and plaster/paint repair. Samples of flooring are being evaluated, with bids to follow. Hopefully we will be able to proceed early next year.
