Hello friends,

Youth Summer Fine Arts Camp

Social Justice - Immigration Team

Notes from the Social Justice Committee

Inertia is a powerful force.

Sometimes I feel like there's nothing much I can do to make a difference in the world. Sometimes I look at the whole problem of immigration in this country, and it absolutely overwhelms me, and consequently I do nothing. And then there's the guilt, because I WANT to do something, but it's all too much and I can't, so once again, nothing. AND then there's the depression because I feel like I'm a bad person because I'm not getting anything done – not making a difference in anyone's life. Drowning in inertia.

I used to tell my kids to break big obstacles down into smaller projects, each one finite, but a step to completing the whole. But "fixing" BIG issues like immigration, unfair imprisonment, squelching of human rights, that's a whole 'nother kettle of fish.

So what can you or I do to make a difference in the BIG social issues of the day? You can start with a little drop of water. Write, call, or email your congresswoman or your lowa senators and make your thoughts known. Write a newsletter article, or a letter to the Editor of your favorite newspaper. A little drop of water, but many drops can make a storm – a flood! You have done something. Want to do a little something more? There are times that we are called upon to witness deportation hearings. If we can, we meet at the appointed time and place and act as silent witnesses to the proceedings, and as a support to the person in danger of deportation. More drops of water. Don't have time but want to help? Members of the Committee have pledged to help fund two women seeking asylum who, because of the way things work now, are not allowed to work

for 6 months before they can get a work permit. We are part of many people from many churches who are doing this, and you can add to that funding. Something more? Some of the Social Justice Committee are becoming volunteers for Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON) at their mostly monthly help nights at Grace UMC (some training is required). Do you prefer a more immediate way of helping? We have a Shelter Meal coming up, and need both casseroles and more hands to serve them. Contact Deacon John if you're interested. And don't forget that we prepare and serve lunch for Connections Café once a month in our own Undercroft. Keep an eye on the website for our July date.

Need help getting started? Come join us around the table after the 10:30 service in the Undercroft on the 3rd Sunday of each month. We'd love to make our circle bigger!

Mozart Mass a Seasonal Highlight

On Sunday, June 2 St. Paul's Cathedral Choir performed Mozart's Missa Beva in D major, KV. 194, a noteworthy liturgical highlight to this year's Choir season. Composed in Salzburg in 1774 – Mozart was just 18 – this short mass expresses the depth of the composer's faith as well as a measure of youthful joy. It was the first of his works to appear in print.

Conducted by Mark Babcock, the Cathedral Choir was joined by soloists Courtney Tabor, Beth DeVries, Ian Heetland, and Ben Blystone, and guest musicians John Helmich, Nathan Thiessen, Stephan Dorff and David Raymond. Performed with energy and clarity throughout, it was a joyous finale to the Cathedral Choir season.

Nevertheless, St. Paul's commitment to devotional and prayerful music continues without pause. Cathedral Organist and Choirmaster Mark Babcock plans to provide choral leadership throughout the summer, including special soloists and a few guest choirs.
